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1. Who We Are

Founded in 1906, the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities (UNSM) is a not-for-profit organization mandated to represent the interests of municipal governments across Nova Scotia. Total membership is 390 elected officials representing all 50 municipalities.

To accomplish this mandate, the UNSM gathers information from all municipalities, lobbies the provincial government on issues which impact all or a number of municipalities, and works to promote and strengthen best practices in local government. Municipal interests are often developed through three caucuses (regional, rural and town) and five regions. For more information on UNSM, visit www.unsm.ca.

To advance important policy issues, the UNSM often works in partnership with the Association of Municipal Administrators, Nova Scotia (AMANS) who represents senior municipal staff across the province. UNSM shares office space with AMANS. For more information on AMANS, visit www.amans.ca.

2. Membership and Dues

UNSM members are represented by municipal elected officials—mayors, wardens and councillors—from all 50 municipalities across the province. Member municipalities pay an annual membership fee as determined by the Board of Directors. The formula requires that each unit pay a base fee with the remaining amount funded through a combination of population and assessment. The only exception is Halifax which pays a capped fee due to its size relative to all other municipal units. The dues formula is approved at the annual general meeting each year and is then applied to the UNSM Budget as approved by the Board in December. UNSM's audited statements are presented annually at the annual general meeting.

3. How Your Membership Can Help Shape the Municipal Agenda

The UNSM offers opportunities for elected representatives to network and share experiences, initiatives, issues and opportunities. UNSM facilitates this through caucus meetings, regional meetings, conferences, workshops, surveys, requests for input, and requests to serve on municipal and provincial committees. The outcomes from these initiatives are significant; the results inform the Board who then meets with the Premier, Roundtables of Ministers, and the Minister of Municipal Affairs to discuss matters of concern to municipalities. UNSM recommendations formed through member input are sent formally to the Province for response.

UNSM's advocacy work on behalf of municipalities is important. Because we are "creatures of the Province", UNSM must represent the municipal voice to the Province. While the UNSM strives to convey the concerns of all municipalities to the province, consensus among all units is not always possible. UNSM has the most success with the Province when we have wide support from our member units. Strength in numbers is key to advancing the municipal agenda.

4. UNSM's Strategic Direction

In 2016, the UNSM Board of Directors held a strategic planning session to discuss the organization's goals and objectives to be achieved over the next number of years. In addition, caucus and regional meetings were held over the last two years where the board received excellent feedback from the membership. Based on the input from these meetings and the strategic planning session, the board came up with the following strategic directions to move the UNSM forward over the next number of years.

4.1 Create stronger, effective municipalities and communities through:

- Evidence based research on municipal priorities, issues, and opportunities
- Meeting with members to build common understanding on key issues
- Developing municipal positions and resolutions
- Sharing best practices, success stories, and tools
- Developing and implementing proactive advocacy strategies with other levels of government and with the public
- Offering workshops and conferences that will assist municipal elected officials and staff in meeting their mandate
- Partnering with AMANS, the Province, federal government and other community and stakeholder organizations on issues of mutual concern.

4.2 Renew UNSM in the following ways:

- Rename and rebrand the organization to remove the word "union"
- Be the collective, thoughtful voice of municipalities
- Serve as facilitator/leader in helping to strengthen municipalities
- Be recognized as an expert on Nova Scotia municipal matters
- Be recognized as the starting point for reaching out to municipalities.

4.3 Serve as an expert in municipal matters in the following ways:

- Host joint website with AMANS to highlight all relevant reports, studies, and articles
- Develop, promote best practices, bylaw/policy templates, council presentations
- Build new partnerships with other organizations such as universities, chambers of commerce, and business improvement districts
- Be focussed on a limited number of priorities with support from membership
- Help advance the work developed by the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM).

4.4 Serve as an advocate to advance key municipal issues through:

- Regular outreach to MLAs to build awareness and support
- Inviting ministers and senior provincial staff to present to the membership
- Actively participating in the Province's legislative agenda and process
- Developing an annual state of the union address
- Building a government relations strategy.

4.5 Engage members through:

- Organizing sessions on timely topics
- Utilizing annual conference to build consensus around key issues and priorities
- Determining key asks of provincial and federal governments
- Increased networking opportunities– including alternatives to face-to-face meetings such as videoconferencing, teleconferencing and webinars–to encourage full participation
- Offering increased membership value through additional programs and services
- Providing UNSM Members Handbook.

5. Governance

5.1 Board of Directors

UNSM's Board of Directors has the important role of setting the goals, objectives and vision of the organization in order to advance the common interests of municipalities across the province. The Board develops policy positions and programs of interest to Nova Scotia's municipalities. The Board is comprised of twelve elected officials (mayors, wardens or

councillors) and one appointed voting member from the Association of Municipal Administrators. The Board meets nine to eleven times annually.

5.2 Officers

UNSM's Officers are the President, Vice President and Past President. The President and Vice President are elected at large at the AGM for a one-year term. Election of the Officers rotates on an annual election cycle. During each cycle, the positions of President, Vice President and Past President will each be filled by members representing towns, rural municipalities and regional municipalities. In 2016-17, the President shall be from a town, the Vice President from a rural municipality and the Past President from a regional municipality.

5.3 Powers and Duties of Officers

The President, subject to the control and direction of the Board of Directors, has general direction of the affairs of the UNSM, chairs all meetings of the Board of Directors, Executive Committee, and special meetings, votes at all meetings and serves as an ex officio member of all UNSM committees. The President is the official spokesperson for UNSM.

The Vice President exercises the authority of the President in the absence or incapacity of the President and performs other duties as required.

The Past President serves as Chair of the Nominations Committee and performs other duties as required.

5.4 Executive Committee

UNSM's Executive Committee makes decisions on behalf of the Board of Directors in between Board meetings. Chaired by the President, it also includes the Vice President, Immediate Past President and Chairs from three caucuses. The Executive Committee meets with the Roundtable of Provincial Ministers.

5.5 Caucuses

The UNSM operates under a caucus structure where the three types of municipal units are represented—towns, rurals, and regionals. Currently there are 26 towns, 22 rurals and 2 regional municipalities. Under the UNSM Bylaws, the Region of Queens is part of the Rural Caucus. The caucuses are represented on the UNSM Board by a chair and two additional representatives. Each municipal elected official is a member of their respective caucus.

The role of each caucus is to discuss and make recommendations to the UNSM on matters of interest and concern to members of the particular caucus. Caucuses operate within the framework of the UNSM and as part of the UNSM structure. They do not have an independent legal existence separate from the UNSM. No caucus has the authority to speak on behalf or bind the UNSM. Each caucus adopts their own procedures and terms of reference governing their operations consistent with the UNSM Bylaws. Caucuses meet at a minimum twice annually to discuss their unique issues—during the UNSM annual fall conference and spring workshop. Typically caucuses meet an additional one or two times over the course of the year.

5.6 Regions

In addition to the caucus structure, the UNSM also meets as regions usually once or twice per year to discuss local or regional issues. Regional meetings are hosted by a particular municipality on a voluntary basis. Often a town and neighbouring rural municipality will co-host a meeting.

The UNSM operates under five regions as follows:

Cape Breton-Strait Area Region - Municipality of Inverness, Municipality of Victoria, Town of Port Hawkesbury, Municipality of Richmond, Town of Mulgrave , District of Guysborough, District of St. Mary's, Town of Antigonish, Municipality of Antigonish , Cape Breton Regional Municipality

Colchester/Cumberland/Pictou/East Hants Region - Town of Truro, Town of Stewiacke, Municipality of Colchester, District of East Hants, Town of Amherst, Town of Oxford, Municipality of Cumberland , Town of New Glasgow, Town of Pictou, Town of Stellarton, Town of Trenton, Town of Westville, Municipality of Pictou

South Shore-HRM Region - Town of Bridgewater, Town of Mahone Bay, Town of Lockeport, Town of Lunenburg, Town of Shelburne , Municipality of the District of Chester, District of Lunenburg, District of Shelburne, Region of Queens, Halifax Regional Municipality

South Western Shore Region - Town of Digby , Town of Clark's Harbour, Town of Yarmouth , Municipality of Argyle, District of Barrington, District of Clare, District Digby, District of Yarmouth

Valley Region - Town of Annapolis Royal, Town of Berwick, Town of Kentville , Town of Middleton, Town of Windsor, Town of Wolfville, Municipality of Annapolis, Municipality of Kings, District of West Hants.

5.7 Staff

UNSM has a staff of five who work on behalf of the Board of Directors and general membership.

- **Executive Director:** Responsible for day-to-day operations including financial and administrative management of the organization.
- **Manager, Member Relations:** Ensures effective two-way communication between the UNSM board and the membership.
- **Infrastructure & Sustainability Officer:** Facilitates learning and capacity building for municipalities to make informed decisions related to operations, service delivery and infrastructure management.
- **Event Planner/Financial Officer:** Maintains UNSM financial records and responsible for logistics in coordinating and executing all UNSM events and seminars.
- **Secretary:** Provides administrative support to UNSM and AMANS offices and secretarial support to UNSM staff and Board.

6. Benefits of Belonging to UNSM

6.1 Ensuring Municipal Issues are Communicated to the Province

The UNSM Executive and Board of Directors works hard on your behalf to ensure important municipal issues and concerns are communicated effectively to the Province. The UNSM achieves this in a number of ways including roundtable meetings with provincial ministers at least twice annually, meetings between the UNSM President and the Premier, the UNSM President and the Minister of Municipal Affairs, and the UNSM Executive Director and Deputy Ministers from various provincial departments that impact municipalities.

In addition, the UNSM conducts Advocacy Days annually where board members meet in Halifax with as many Nova Scotia MLA's as possible. These meetings provide an opportunity to:

- build relationships between provincial and municipal elected officials;
- look at how the Province and municipalities can work together to better serve the interests of all Nova Scotians and to minimize their collective tax burden; and
- build support towards provincial-municipal partnerships on an infrastructure plan and other issues critical to communities.

UNSM members have an opportunity to participate on a number of municipal-provincial committees which impact municipal policy. *For a list of current committees, see appendix A.*

6.2 Protecting the Rights of Municipalities

The UNSM has a responsibility to protect the rights of its member units. The UNSM advocates on behalf of its members for important provincial legislative changes to ensure municipalities are able to meet their responsibilities. Moreover, the UNSM monitors provincial legislation to ensure municipal interests are addressed. From time to time, the Province will discuss potential legislation with the UNSM Board. In cases where the Board is asked not to consult with members on proposed legislation, the Board will provide feedback directly to the Province.

UNSM is also working toward the development of a consultation protocol to be followed when new provincial legislation or regulations impacting municipal operations is being developed. This will ensure the Province is aware of the implications to municipalities. It will also encourage the development of legislation and regulations that can be implemented effectively and efficiently.

A recent example occurred this past year when a developer challenged a municipality under its subdivision bylaw. The developer implied municipalities did not have the authority under the MGA. UNSM provided legal representation in support of the position put forward by the municipality. This support was a factor in the developer settling out of court. Another initiative in recent years included mandatory conversion to LED streetlights, where UNSM was successful in allowing municipalities more time to implement the provincial regulation.

6.3 Sharing of Information

Sharing of information is a priority for UNSM and one which will continue to expand. The UNSM provides a mechanism to bring elected representatives and staff together to learn from experts and each other. Information is sent to members on a variety of issues including activities of the Board, federal and provincial programs and legislative reviews, latest municipal research, and events/workshops taking place on topics of interest. Examples of recent workshops include the annual CAO/CEO forum, how to advance recommendations in the oneNS report, municipal restructuring, and forestry. Many of UNSM workshops are offered for free or at a minimal charge.

Some of the primary mechanisms UNSM uses to share information include the following:

- Timely emails on opportunities to learn, provide comment, and apply for funding programs. The subject line in the email will indicate if action is required and if there is a deadline for a response.
- Newsletters published nine or ten times a year, providing updates on Board activities and items of interest
- Municipal Voice—a quarterly publication with informative articles

- Fall Conference and Annual General Meeting, November 30 – December 2, 2016, in Halifax - the premier event for UNSM where the majority of members come together to hear from the Province about municipal issues, with an opportunity to ask the Province about matters of concern. Members choose their new Board, and provide input to the priorities for organization. Learning and networking opportunities, sharing of experiences and best practices make the event a useful investment of members' time.
- Spring Workshop– typically held in May– focuses on learning opportunities and sharing of experiences.
- UNSM Website www.unsm.ca: provides useful information about events, programs and services, relevant studies and publications, tools, member lists, and useful links.

6.4 Partnerships

AMANS: The Association of Municipal Administrators, Nova Scotia is a not for profit organization for professionals involved in the administration of municipal government in Nova Scotia. Its members include Chief Administrative Officers, Clerks and Deputies, Finance staff and other municipal professionals. AMANS is a long-time stakeholder and partner of the UNSM providing valuable objective advice on issues impacting municipal government. Not only is AMANS a strong ally of the UNSM, it acts as an educator and sounding board. It helps build capacity and knowledge by providing training and development for both staff and elected officials on many topics. In addition, it provides tools and resources such as model by-laws and best practices. AMANS is co-located with UNSM, ensuring a close working relationship. Information about AMANS is available on their website: www.amans.ca.

PVSC: Property Valuation Services Corporation (PVSC) is an independent, not-for-profit organization responsible for valuing all real property (residential, commercial and resource) in Nova Scotia, approximately 600,000 properties, on an annual basis. Each January, PVSC provides an assessment roll to municipalities, which is used to calculate property taxes, and delivers property assessment notices to every Nova Scotia property owner. To support administrative and operational efficiencies, the PVSC also provides value-added property and information services to municipalities.

PVSC adheres to mass appraisal standards set by the International Association of Assessing Officers (IAAO), and is mandated by the Nova Scotia Assessment Act and governed by the PVSC Act. The PVSC is funded by all municipalities across the province under a formula outlined in its governing legislation. The PVSC's Board of Directors is comprised of six municipal officials, three municipal administrators, three independent members, and the Executive Director of the UNSM.

If you have questions about property assessment or would like information about their value-added services for municipalities, you are encouraged to contact the PVSC. Additionally, residents of your municipality should be directed to PVSC's service centre when they have questions about their property assessment.

FCM: The Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) is the national voice of municipal government, representing 90 per cent of Canada’s municipal population. Established in 1901, it includes Canada’s small and urban communities, and its largest cities. FCM advocates to have the needs of municipalities and its citizens reflected in federal policies and programs. Nova Scotia has four members on the FCM Board, including the UNSM President, a member from Halifax Council and two other members from Nova Scotia municipalities. Board members are elected at the FCM annual conference, held typically in June. As well, Councillor Bill Karsten, Halifax, is a member of the FCM Executive, elected in June 2016 as third Vice President.

Federal Gas Tax Fund Communications: Since April 2015, UNSM has been providing support to the Department of Municipal Affairs to administer the 2014-24 Gas Tax Fund (GTF) Agreement, focusing its efforts on communications and asset management. This work will support municipalities in meeting GTF requirements and to assist them in fully utilizing this federal funding program. UNSM also aims to raise the profile of local GTF initiatives, making a strong case for continued (and possibly enhanced) federal support.

UNSM’s GTF work includes: developing municipal project spotlights to highlight best practices and innovation in Nova Scotia, collecting information for GTF project and signage reports, creating communication and asset management resources (such as toolkits, fact sheets, and workshops), and assisting municipalities in undertaking sustainability initiatives that support the new federal GTF pillars. 6.5 Programs and Services

The UNSM offers a number of programs and services to its members with reduced fees or added value options in a variety of areas. These include:

Councillor Employee and Family Assistance Program - All UNSM members have access to the Employee and Family Assistance Program (EFAP) provided by Morneau Shepell. The EFAP is a voluntary, confidential, short-term counselling and advisory service that connects individuals and their immediate family members to a network of dedicated counselling professionals who are available to provide assistance 24 hours a day. Types of counselling services include:

- Working to resolve concerns impacting your work, health or life
- Family support
- Financial Support and Financial Planning
- Health Coaching

- Healthy Relationships
- Legal Support
- Naturopathic Services
- Nutrition Support
- Fitness Support
- Stress Coach
- Separation and Divorce
- Smoking Cessation.



As part of this program, the UNSM Group Benefits Plan members also have access to the Fitness Coach Connects program. This popular program consists of a physical health assessment online, interactive online program, and one-on-one sessions with a coach.

Employee Benefits - The UNSM provides a comprehensive, cost-effective group employee benefits plan for member municipalities. The plan is designed and managed to meet municipalities' objectives for attraction and retention, and supports the wellbeing of its employees and families. The UNSM benefits program leverages the collective base of municipal employees to provide enhanced benefits, while maintaining lower costs for employees and employers. It includes medical, dental, life insurance and Long Term Disability (LTD), and other optional and complimentary benefits.

The plan is overseen by the UNSM Health & Benefits Committee, which reports directly to UNSM Board of Directors. The Benefits Consultant, Morneau Shepell, provides the consulting services for the plan, and to individual municipalities and also provides additional consulting services in support of the program.



General Insurance - The UNSM offers a general insurance program through the Atlantic Insurance Brokers Consortium. The Consortium, managed by Frank Cowan Company, consists of Arthur J. Gallagher, Fraser and Hoyt, and MCT. This program provides municipalities and associated entities (including Joint Service Boards, Care Homes, Economic Development, Utilities, Sports Facilities) with a comprehensive and stable insurance solution with local customer support and claims handling throughout Nova Scotia. The Atlantic Insurance Brokers Consortium further supports UNSM members through unique value added services. These services are provided to members at no cost and include:

1. Contractual reviews with a focus on insurance and risk analysis
2. Liaising with municipal solicitors on complex and day to day contracts and agreements
3. Real property risk inspection and valuation services
4. Education seminars on a wide range of available topics
5. Risk management bulletins and reference materials
6. Direct assistance to municipal staff on matters including facility use agreements, construction documents, reviewing evidences of insurance, guidance and direction for outlining risk and risk avoidance for new programs or municipal initiatives including recreation and co-management agreements.

HST Offset Program - In 1998, the UNSM negotiated the HST Offset Program with the Province. It is intended to lessen the financial impact on municipalities of paying the Harmonized Sales Tax. Over the past decade, the Program has provided approximately \$78 million to municipalities with \$ 6 million distributed to municipalities annually. Payments are based on municipal expenditures in the previous year.

Home and Auto Insurance - UNSM members receive preferred group rates on home and auto insurance through TD Insurance Meloche Monnex. To join the program visit: <http://www.group.tdinsurance.com/en/home>.



Long Service Award Program - The UNSM Long Service Awards Program offers recognition beginning with those elected officials who have served on Council for a minimum of 10 years.

Long Service Completion Award Program - The UNSM Long Service Completion Awards Program offers recognition to those elected officials who are retiring—either voluntarily or as the result of municipal restructuring.

Preferred Courier Rate - The UNSM offers a preferred courier rate to municipalities through Canada Post.



Preferred Hotel Rate - UNSM members have access to a special rate at the UNSM host hotel—The Westin Nova Scotian in Halifax.
