Dear Premier McNeil:

I am writing on behalf of the Board of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities regarding the government's interest in alternative service delivery for the provision of land registry services. I am also writing to the Ministers of Service Nova Scotia and Municipal Affairs to request a meeting to discuss this with them, however given the timing of this initiative, the Board asked that I convey our interests and concerns directly to you.

As you know, municipalities' primary source of revenue is the property tax. The information collected and compiled by Land Services is essential to the Property Valuation Services Corporation (PVSC) and to municipalities. Under the PVSC Act, the information required by the PVSC to perform its duties is provided to them without charge. Should your government choose an alternative service delivery option, our municipalities will expect the data to continue to be provided to PVSC free of charge. To do otherwise would constitute a new cost downloaded to municipalities.

Given the speed with which the government is moving forward since its announcement in July, we are concerned the tender documents for the expression of interest for the land registry may have been prepared without a clear understanding of the requirements from PVSC. If taxpayers are to be properly notified of their property taxes, the data transferred from the Land Registry to PVSC must be accurate and timely. This is critical for municipalities, and the tender documents must reflect this.

The current land registry is not perfect, and we understand investment is required to improve it. The original intent when the Assessment Services was transferred to municipalities was that transfer of the land registry would also be explored. Despite requests from PVSC to the province to consider this, it has not been done. The Board feels the province should explore this with PVSC before it reaches out to the private sector to provide the service.

PVSC has a proven track record in successfully transforming a provincial department to an independent corporation. Its human resource experience, rural and geographic presence, and experience in implementing enterprise wide

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technology systems have proven it can rise to the challenge. Most significantly, integrating the land registry with the PVSC operations offers an opportunity for managing property data through a single window, strengthening the assessment and taxation system. The UNSM Board is confident the PVSC can achieve new efficiencies and value added services while maintaining service delivery throughout the province. We think this is an alternative which will help the province achieve its goals, in true partnership with municipalities.

We trust you will seriously consider our willingness to work with the province on this initiative. I look forward to meeting with your Ministers on this issue. I would also be pleased to meet with you, on this or any matter involving municipalities.
